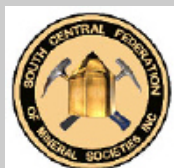

STEPHEN E. CLABAUGH
A.G.M.S. Life Member

We sadly report the passing of Dr. Stephen E. Clabaugh on December 2, 2010, at the age of 92. Dr. Clabaugh joined the A.G.M.S. in 1950 and later was awarded a Life Membership. He was Professor Emeritus in Geological Sciences at U.T. Austin's Department of Geological Sciences. Clabaugh taught mineralogy and petrology, specializing in metamorphic and volcanic rocks, among other courses, and supervised 44 Ph.D. and Masters students during his active teaching years. During his teaching career at U.T., he received many awards for outstanding academic, scientific and scholarly achievement and for dedication to the teaching profession.

He received his bachelor's (1940) and master's (1941) degrees at U.T. Austin and his Ph.D. from Harvard (1950). He began his teaching career at U.T. in 1950, and after retiring from teaching enjoyed his home on the Pedernales River near Spicewood. Frequent travels took Steve and his wife, Pat, to many parts of the world where he added to his collection of rocks and minerals.

SCFMS Endowment Fund: Josie Middleton and Ron Carman explained that only the interest from the endowment fund is used to endow scholarships. Patron certificates are awarded for member contributions of \$100 and club contributions of \$100 plus \$1 per member. Linda Northcote (deceased) donated her minerals to the club and asked that we sell some to help the club and the American Federation. From Linda's estate, close to \$1,200 was donated, from which AGMS received eight honors.

Show Committee: Sue Postlethwait, Show Chair, reported that Brian Wetzig is now the Show Treasurer. Sue asked for someone to replace Robert Morriss who has stepped down from overseeing the Touch Table where he displayed rough material with related finished cabs. This show attraction is very active on Friday (school groups day), but settles down the other two days. Sue said she ordered the wrong show pin design last year. She brought a bag of pins made with the correct design---Randy Gage's design of a petrified wood stump with crystals coming out of it---and they are for sale for \$3.00.

Newsletter: Diann Hill was congratulated on doing a good job on her first edition of The Stone Chipper. Diann said she'd like to have more articles from members and plans to offer a quarterly prize for best article. Diann has set a 10th of the month deadline for newsletter submissions. AGMS Board Meeting Minutes Synopsis

The AGMS Board (8 board members & 8 general members) met on February 1, 2011, to conduct club business. Below is a listing of the highlights of this meeting; a complete set of minutes is available upon request.

Minutes: The January minutes were approved with the correction of James Lopez's proposed motion to read exactly as printed on his handout.

Treasurer's Report: Wing Evans made a report of the bank account beginning and ending balances. He also reported that the paid members list has 50 line items (each line item could include multiple family members). Dues payments are lagging behind.

Old Business

Review Proposed Webmaster SOP: Diann Hill e-mailed the Webmaster SOP to all Board members and was present to answer questions. A motion passed that the Webmaster SOP be accepted as written with minor corrections.

New Business

Cabbing Contest: Sue Postlethwait appeared before the Board to ask if there was support for continuing the cabbing contest she began last year. A motion passed unanimously to continue support of the cabochon contest.

Letter of Appreciation Request: Gene Healy said he had spoken with Teri Smith of Alpine on a January rock hunt. As an assist to getting or keeping rock hunting locations around Alpine, a letter could be given to landowners from the Board saying how we benefited from the access and also expressing our appreciation for Teri Smith and her care of the land. A motion passed that the club will give a testimonial letter to Teri Smith of Alpine, TX. Gene will ask Teri for particulars and have Robert Morriss compose the letter.

Class Syllabus: Kathleen Howard presented a syllabus for a proposed gem and minerals short course to be taught in two consecutive 3-week segments, on the 2nd, 3rd and 4th Monday of each month. Hours will be 7:00 to 8:30 PM and the cost \$10 per person. A motion passed unanimously that we adopt and approve Kathleen Howard's proposal for a gem and minerals short course. Kathleen also brought a new syllabus for a cabbing class, but Joyce Hrapsky said her older approved version had more detail. The two will be compared and combined if needed.

Discussion and Possible Resolution of Board Member/Instructor Conflict: Discussion had begun when James Lopez entered the meeting and requested his \$15 membership fee be returned in cash. He received the \$15 cash and resigned his membership. The discussion was closed.

Tabled items: Scholarship Update, Library Fund Commitment with Credit Card Use, Discussion and Possible Action on Reimbursement for Instructors Policy.

Susan went through all the committee members to be sure they were still heading up that committee.

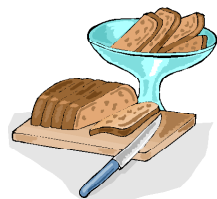

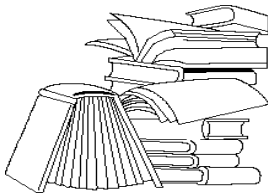
